



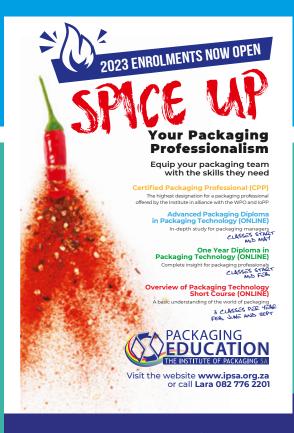

UNPACKING THE SOUTH AFRICAN PLASTIC PACT at King David Mowbray Golf Course with Michelle Penlington

What is SA Plastic Pact?

It is a collaborative initiative that will create a circular economy for plastics packaging.

Why the SA Plastic Pact?

Over the past 50 years, the use of plastics worldwide has increased 200 fold and has grown at a rate of 4% per annum since the year 2000. However for all the positive applications, benefits and uses of plastic, the negative impacts of irresponsible consumption and disposal of plastics are far reaching.

Ardagh glass factory tour, Bellville

Glass packaging was preceded by the use of clay based ceramic pottery. This first begun to be used in 1500 B.C in Egypt. After the invention of the blow pipe in 300 B.C by the Phoenicians, the production of completely transparent glass was begun. Blown glass enabled craftsmen to mould glass into a large variety of shapes. The blown glass containers were made of thick durable glass that was heavy yet preferred because of the many benefits offered.

Our visit to Ardagh Glass (formerly Consol glass) in early July was not a trip back in time. We viewed the major steps in a modern glass container factory, producing tons of moulded containers daily. Materials are all sourced locally, and a large part of the recipe is broken glass, sorted by colour, known as cullet. We saw impressive close up views of the furnace running at about 1550°C and then followed the production line to the automatic cutting and handling of hot gobs of glass to the 2 stage moulding machines one floor below. Hot and cold end treatments of the glass containers that followed ensured that the containers were strengthened and surface lubricated for use on customers filling lines.

To see glass containers in the making, close up, and to learn about managing a process with so much potential for variation, was fascinating.

Guala Closures factory tour, Paarden Eiland

Our tour on 2nd November was a real eye-opener. Few people know of the intricacies of the making and printing of closures. We traced the aluminium plate through numerous shaping / stamping, varnishing / printing / decoration, inspection stages to deliver an

aesthetically pleasing product. And this at high production speeds and emphasis on high quality to keep the brand conscious customers in the wine and liquor trade happy.

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The word sustainability is used a lot these days, it's a new buzz word. Yet few of us know the actual meaning of the word.

What is sustainability? Sustainability means meeting our own needs without compromising the ability of future generations to meet their individual needs. In addition to natural resources, we also need social and economic resources. Sustainability is not just environmental-ism.

We humans are the only creatures on this planet that creates waste. In nature, one creatures waste is another creatures food source. We seem satisfied with creating waste, that ubiquitous wheelie bin that takes our troubles away. The truth is our landfills are not sustainable and will not meet the needs for future generations if we continue to follow the same wastage pattern. We often accept things for the way they are without looking for more sustainable options. When writing this article, I sat down with my cup of coffee and started thinking about what to write about and there it was right in front of me. My coffee! I do enjoy a good coffee in the mornings.

It is estimated over 2.25 BILLION cups of coffee are consumed in the world daily. It's the second biggest traded commodity next to oil. Over 90 percent of coffee production takes place in developing countries, whilst consumption happens primarily in industrialized economies. This is not sustainable for both our social and economic resources.

Coffee bags are seldom recycled as it is a multi-layer plastic?. So, if we do the maths, that means you can

expect to get around 71 cups of coffee out of a 500g oag of roasted coffee beans. Of course, this is based on a standard, single shot of coffee. This means around 30 million x 500g bags a day are being used! Our favourite brand in the office measures 260mm, if we placed them end to end that is enough to circle the Earth 71 times each year.

But What are the solutions???

Enviro PouchTM, a high barrier paper that is not only plastic free and compostable but is also fully recyclable in the normal paper stream. It is manufactured with sustainably sourced FSC paper that is suitable for direct food contact as it has aroma and grease barriers.

It also makes financial sense to switch. More and more consumers, especially Gen Z consumers under 24, are vocal about only wanting to spend their money on brands and products that align with their personal and political values. And what is one of the most important causes to current digital consumers? The planet itself!

The SA Plastics Pact target is to have 100% of packaging reusable, recyclable or compostable by 2025. Enviro Pouch™ is a top contender as it provides a solution for several products such as coffee, tea and nuts and many more.
